JOB PURPOSE:

The successful candidate will replace Dr Edel Lamb, senior lecturer in Early Modern Literature, for a period of twelve months while she completes a project entitled 'Writing Early Modern Girlhood (c. 1544-1704), funded by the Leverhulme Trust. The appointee will deliver effective teaching and learning in Early Modern English Literature, with a particular focus on drama, and will examine at both undergraduate and postgraduate level, and contribute to School administration/outreach activity.

MAJOR DUTIES:

Teaching:

- 1. Convene modules in Shakespeare and Renaissance Performance, Gender, Space. Where appropriate, other teaching duties may be assigned by the Subject Lead.
- 2. Deliver teaching and assessment activities within own area of specialism (lectures, tutorials, setting/marking coursework, etc.) to undergraduate and postgraduate students.
- 3. Select appropriate assessment instruments and criteria, assess the work and progress of students by reference to the criteria and provide constructive feedback to students.
- 4. Seek ways of improving performance by reflecting on teaching design and delivery and obtaining and analysing feedback.
- 5. Supervise undergraduate and postgraduate dissertations.

Research:

- 1. Undertake research in a relevant area.
- 2. Develop and plan an area of personal research and expertise, and/or undertake research under supervision within a specific research project or as a member of a research team.
- 3. Provide guidance to other staff and students on own specialist area.

Administration/Contribution to the Community:

- 1. Contribute to the School's outreach strategy by developing external links.
- 2. Provide pastoral care for students within own area to ensure that all issues are dealt with in a timely, sympathetic and effective manner.
- 3. Carry out designated light routine School administrative duties e.g. committee work and course administration.
- 4. Be responsible for the record–keeping associated with teaching and the preparation of teaching materials.

Planning and Organising:

- 1. Plan and manage own teaching and tutorials as agreed with the Subject Lead and Head of School/mentor.
- 2. Design/update modules in line with School's teaching strategy.
- 3. Plan and prepare research outputs to meet publication deadlines.

Resource Management Responsibilities:

- 1. Use teaching and research resources as required.
- 2. Act as mentor for students.

Internal and External Relationships:

- 1. Contribute to School Board and Examination Board and such committees relevant to administrative duties.
- 2. Collaborate with other staff within School.
- 3. Contribute to the School's outreach programme by establishing links with local community groups, industries etc.

ESSENTIAL CRITERIA:

- 1. Normally have or be about to obtain a relevant PhD.
- 2. A track record of publication in early modern / Renaissance literature commensurate with current stage in career.
- 3. A minimum of 3 years' research experience in a relevant field.
- 4. Experience of teaching Shakespeare and early modern drama at tertiary level.
- 5. Ability to contribute to broader management and administrative processes.
- 6. High level of analytical capability.
- 7. Ability to communicate complex information clearly.
- 8. Effective interpersonal skills.
- 9. Engagement in continuous professional development.
- 10. Ability to assess and organise resources.

DESIRABLE CRITERIA:

- 1. PGCHET and/or membership of an appropriate professional and/or teaching body e.g. HEA.
- 2. Experience of teaching in broad-based, team-taught survey modules in English Literature at tertiary level.
- 3. Experience of supervising undergraduate and/or Masters-level dissertations.
