## JOB PURPOSE:

To be an active member of the Queen's University Centre for Economic History and the Centre for Economics, Policy and History both headed up by Dr. Chris Colvin and Professor John Turner. To be active in the delivery of their own research programme and assist the Centre directors in the outreach activities of the Centre.

### **MAJOR DUTIES:**

- 1. Undertake their own research project for the duration of the project under the direction of the two directors.
- 2. Present regular progress reports on research to members of the research group or to external audiences to disseminate and publicise research findings.
- 3. Prepare material for publication in international journals and presentations at international conferences.
- 4. Carry out the outreach activities of the Centre and routine administrative duties as requested, e.g., arranging research group meetings.
