JOB PURPOSE:

To undertake research in line with the School's research strategy, to teach at undergraduate and postgraduate level, and to contribute to School administration/outreach activity.

MAJOR DUTIES:

Teaching:

- 1. Deliver teaching and assessment activities on general film practice modules on BA and MA including lectures, seminars, setting/marking coursework, practical workshops, and relevant fieldwork to undergraduates and postgraduates.
- 2. Select appropriate assessment instruments and criteria, assess the work and progress of students by reference to the criteria and provide constructive feedback to students.
- 3. Seek ways of improving performance by reflecting on teaching design and delivery and obtaining and analysing feedback.
- 4. Supervise and/or support supervision of creative practice and Practice as Research (PaR) at postgraduate level.
- 5. Oversee research students as directed by Head of School.
- 6. Plan and develop independent teaching contributions and contribute to the design or revision of course units.
- 7. Help to develop appropriate teaching approaches and contribute to curriculum development.

Research:

- 1. Develop and plan an area of personal research and expertise, and/or undertake research under supervision within a specific research project or as a member of a research team.
- 2. Publish quality research in appropriate journals, venues etc. and present work at conferences.
- 3. Carry out analysis, critical evaluations and interpretations using methodologies and other techniques appropriate to area of research.
- 4. Where appropriate, source and secure external funding in collaboration with others from the relevant funding bodies to ensure continued growth of the School's/area's research profile.
- 5. Provide guidance to other staff and students on own specialist area.
- 6. May work/collaborate on original research with colleagues in other institutions.

Administration/Contribution to the Community:

- 1. Contribute to the School's outreach strategy by developing external links.
- 2. Provide pastoral care for students within own area to ensure that all issues are dealt with in a timely, sympathetic and effective manner.
- 3. Carry out designated routine School administrative duties, including, for example, committee work, course administration etc.
- 4. Be responsible for the record–keeping associated with teaching and the preparation of teaching materials.

ESSENTIAL CRITERIA:

- 1. Completed or nearly completed PhD in Film/Screen Media; or postgraduate qualification in Film Practice; or equivalent professional experience and international profile.
- 2. Relevant teaching experience to at least degree level in documentary filmmaking practice.

- 3. Ability to teach a core range of film production and technical skills such as cinematography and postproduction.
- 4. Evidence of ability to supervise film practice research at UG and PG level.
- 5. A record of recent publications of internationally excellent research and/or practice research outputs in Film/Screen Media appropriate to career stage.
- 6. Ability to contribute to broader management and administrative processes.
- 7. Demonstrable ability to make funding applications and knowledge of the broader field of moving image culture.
- 8. Ability to communicate complex information clearly.
- 9. Effective interpersonal skills.
- 10. Engagement in continuous professional development.
- 11. Ability to assess and organise resources.

- 1. PGCHET/UK HEA Certificate in Professional Studies or equivalent overseas teaching qualification.
- 2. Evidence of securing research funding at or after post-doctoral career stage.
- 3. Experience of active participation in international and interdisciplinary research networks appropriate to stage.
- 4. A record of significant research impact beyond the academic community appropriate to career stage.
- 5. Experience collaborating with relevant film and screen industry, cultural, and educational organisations.
